

LET US PONDER TOGETHER...

FR. STUART PONDERS THE VISITATION

As I reflect on the Visitation, that tender and profound moment when Mary journeys to Elizabeth's home, I am struck by the richness of its meaning for us as believers. This episode, recorded in Luke's Gospel, is much more than a meeting between two relatives. It is a moment of deep spiritual significance that offers powerful lessons for our own faith journeys. The Visitation invites us to reflect on service, humility, joy, and the Holy Spirit's work in our lives.

First and foremost, Mary's journey to Elizabeth is a profound act of love and service. Having just received the astonishing news of her divine maternity, Mary could have stayed in Nazareth, focused on her own extraordinary calling. Instead, she chooses to set aside her own needs to help her cousin, who is also experiencing a miraculous pregnancy in her advanced age. Mary's selflessness inspires us to step out of our own concerns and look for ways to serve others. The Visitation reminds us that our faith is not lived out in isolation but through acts of love and service to those around us.

As Christians, this teaches us that true discipleship often involves a willingness to go out of our way to accompany and support others. Like Mary, we are called to be attentive to the needs of those in our lives—family, friends, neighbours, and even strangers. By doing so, we imitate her self-giving love and embody Christ's call to love our neighbour as ourselves.

The humility of both Mary and Elizabeth in this encounter is also deeply inspiring. Mary, carrying the Son of God, does not draw attention to her exalted role. Instead, she comes humbly as a cousin, offering her presence and help. Elizabeth, filled with the Holy Spirit, recognizes Mary's unique dignity, exclaiming, "Who am I that the mother of my Lord should come to me?" (Luke 1:43). This moment teaches us that humility is the foundation of all true relationships—with God and with others. Only when we approach life with humility can we fully recognize and celebrate the presence of Christ in those around us.

The joy of the Visitation is another profound gift. As Mary greets Elizabeth, the unborn John the Baptist leaps in Elizabeth's womb, and Elizabeth herself bursts into praise. Mary responds with her own song of joy, the Magnificat, glorifying God for His mighty deeds. This joy flows from their awareness of

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God's presence and work. For us, too, the Visitation is a reminder that faith brings joy—a joy that is meant to be shared. In recognizing Christ's presence, both in our lives and in the lives of others, we are invited to rejoice and to share that joy with the world.

Finally, the Visitation reminds us of the power of the Holy Spirit. Elizabeth's recognition of Mary's role and John's response in the womb are works of the Spirit, who reveals Christ and unites believers in faith and love. In our own lives, the Spirit continues to guide us, enabling us to recognize Christ in others and empowering us to bear witness to His love.

The Visitation is a beautiful model of faith in action—faith that is lived out through service, humility, joy, and openness to the Spirit. As we ponder this encounter, may we, like Mary, go forth to serve with love and humility, bringing Christ's presence into the lives of those we meet. In doing so, we join in the song of Mary and Elizabeth, proclaiming the greatness of the Lord and rejoicing in His saving work.



SAINTS FOR MAY

7TH MAY: ST JOHN OF BEVERLEY (-721)



John of Beverley was born at Harpham a few miles from Driffield on the Yorkshire Wolds. He studied at Canterbury under St Adrian, the African-born abbot of the famous monastery there, who was a great scripture scholar and a fine teacher of Greek and Latin. When John returned to the North, he entered the double monastery at Whitby under the remarkable abbess, St Hilda, who had a great influence on many of the outstanding religious people of her time.


In 687 John was consecrated Bishop of Hexham in succession to Bishop Eata, one of the twelve disciples of St Aidan and the teacher of St Cuthbert. During his time at Hexham, John ordained the future St Bede as priest. He was a good pastoral bishop, a man who loved the Scriptures, and a patient teacher. Like many of his contemporaries, he also had a deep-seated need for prayerful solitude and used to retire to a quiet place on the banks of the Tyne for prayer and the study of Scriptures, especially during the season of Lent.

In 705 he was appointed to the See of York in succession to St Bosa, himself a former monk of the monastery at Whitby. John remained in the diocese for 12 years but the call of solitude remained strong, and four years before his death he retired to Beverley to a religious house he founded there.

John died on 7 May 721, having worked for more than thirty years as a bishop. His shrine became famous up and down the country and was considered to be one of the chief places of devotion in England for many years. He was canonized in 1037.

REFLECTION: Lord God, who made Blessed John of Beverley an archbishop in your church, eminent for his ardent love and that faith which overcomes the world at his intercession grant that we ourselves persevering in faith and love may join him in glory.

27TH MAY: ST AUGUSTINE OF CANTERBURY (- 605?)



Christianity in Britain started early but was largely submerged by the pagan Anglo-Saxon invasions of the fifth and sixth centuries. It remained alive only in the far west, which remained British because it was too remote and inaccessible for the invaders to attack. Pope Gregory organised a party of thirty monks to travel to south-eastern England and spread the Gospel there, and chose as their leader Augustine, prior of the monastery of St Andrew in Rome.

They landed in 597, and were welcomed by the king of Kent, Ethelbert, who became a Christian along with many of his subjects.

A second wave of missionaries arrived in 601. Augustine went to Arles, in France, where he was consecrated archbishop of the English, and then returned to Canterbury to set up his see. The mission prospered, and he founded two more sees, at London and at Rochester in Kent. However, in the far west of Britain, where British bishops had survived the pagan invasions – or where they had fled to escape them – Augustine was less successful in establishing his authority.


The traditions of the Celtic church were different from the Roman ones, and bishops who had guided their people for generations were not about to submit to a jumped-up missionary from overseas. It took several generations for the whole of Great Britain to become Christian and for the English and British liturgical traditions to be reconciled.

Augustine died at Canterbury on 26 May 604 or 605.

REFLECTION: Almighty God, you led the English people to the gospel by the preaching of Saint Augustine of Canterbury. Grant that his work may last on in the Church

RECIPE: ASPARAGUS PASTA

INGREDIENTS (serves 4)

- 350g/12oz asparagus, woody ends removed
- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
- 1 tbsp fresh thyme leaves
- 350g/12oz short pasta, such as fusilli or penne
- 100g/3½oz peas, fresh or frozen and defrosted
- 1 lemon, zested, plus juice of half
- 50g/1³/40z Parmesan (or similar vegetarian hard cheese), grated, plus extra to serve
- salt and freshly ground black pepper

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Remove the tips of the asparagus and set aside. Finely chop the remaining stems. Heat the oil in a large frying pan over a medium heat. Fry the onion, garlic, thyme and chopped asparagus stems for 10 minutes, or until tender.
- 2. Meanwhile, cook the pasta in a saucepan of boiling water for 8–10 minutes, adding the asparagus tips and peas for the final 3 minutes of cooking. Drain and reserve 150ml/5fl oz cooking water.
- 3. Transfer the asparagus stems mixture to a blender. Add the lemon zest, lemon juice and Parmesan and season with salt and pepper. Add a splash of the pasta water and blend until smooth.
- 4. Return to the frying pan and gently fold in the pasta, asparagus tips and peas. Pour in enough of the reserved cooking water to make a rich sauce.
- 5. Divide between four plates and serve with extra Parmesan.



TOUR OF THE NEW TESTAMENT

THE LETTER TO THE EPHESIANS

Ephesians is the great Pauline letter about the church. It deals, however, not so much with a congregation in the city of Ephesus in Asia Minor as with the worldwide church, the head of which is Christ (Eph 4:15), the purpose of which is to be the instrument for making God's plan of salvation known throughout the universe (Eph 3:9–10). Yet this ecclesiology is anchored in God's saving love, shown in Jesus Christ (Eph 2:4–10), and the whole of redemption is rooted in the plan and accomplishment of the triune God (Eph 1:3–14). The language is often that of doxology (Eph 1:3–14) and prayer (cf. Eph 1:15–23; 3:14–19), indeed of liturgy and hymns (Eph 3:20–21; 5:14).

The majestic chapters of Ephesians emphasize the unity in the church of Christ that has come about for both Jews and Gentiles within God's household (Eph 1:15–2:22, especially Eph 2:11–22) and indeed the "seven unities" of church, Spirit, hope; one Lord, faith, and baptism; and the one God (Eph 4:4–6). Yet the concern is not with the church for its own sake but rather as the means for mission in the world (Eph 3:1–4:24). The gifts Christ gives its members are to lead to growth and renewal (Eph 4:7–24). Ethical admonition is not lacking either; all aspects of human life and relationships are illumined by the light of Christ (Eph 4:25–6:20).

The letter is seemingly addressed by Paul to Christians in Ephesus (Eph 1:1), a place where the apostle labored for well over two years (Acts 19:10). Yet there is a curiously impersonal tone to the writing for a community with which Paul was so intimately acquainted (cf. Eph 3:2 and Eph 4:21). There are no personal greetings (cf. Eph 6:23). More significantly, important early manuscripts omit the words "in Ephesus" (see note on Eph 1:1). Many therefore regard the letter as an encyclical or "circular letter" sent to a number of churches in Asia Minor, the addressees to be designated in each place by its bearer, Tychicus (Eph 6:21–22). Others think that Ephesians is the letter referred to in Col 4:16 as "to the Laodiceans."

Paul, who is designated as the sole author at Eph 1:1, is described in almost unparalleled terms with regard to the significant role he has in God's plan for bringing the Gentiles to faith in Christ (Eph 3:1–12). Yet at the time of writing he is clearly in prison (Eph 3:1; 4:1; 6:20), suffering afflictions (Eph 3:13). Traditionally this "Captivity Epistle" has, along with Colossians, Philippians, and Philemon, been dated to an imprisonment in Rome, likely in

A.D. 61–63. Others appeal to an earlier imprisonment, perhaps in Caesarea (Acts 23:27–27:2). Since the early nineteenth century, however, much of critical scholarship has considered the letter's style and use of words (especially when compared with Colossians), its concept of the church, and other points of doctrine put forward by the writer as grounds for serious doubt about authorship by Paul. The letter may then be the work of a secretary writing at the apostle's direction or of a later disciple who sought to develop Paul's ideas for a new situation around A.D. 80–100.

- i. Address (1:1-14)
- ii. Unity of the Church in Christ (1:15–2:22)
- iii. World Mission of the Church (3:1-4:24)
- iv. Daily Conduct, an Expression of Unity (4:25-6:20)
- v. Conclusion (6:21–24)






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
